

### Water secured for future with Drought Preparedness Grant

After producing hay and chaff for almost 40 years in the Lockyer Valley, Steve Neuendorf knows the importance of securing water for his enterprise now and for the future.

So when he found out QRIDA was administering drought support grants and loans to help prepare producers for future droughts, he applied straight away.

"I used the Drought Preparedness Grant for purchasing a boom irrigator and also putting down another bore so if there were any droughts, I'd have plenty of water," he said.

Not only has investing in water infrastructure mitigated the impacts of future droughts for Steve, but it's also helped him improve his hay and chaff business.

"The boom irrigator is very efficient because it is low pressure, so you don't need as high electricity to make it run and it is also water efficient because it's spread out and it doesn't go up high and get blown away by the wind," he said.

"Nothing will grow without water, with the new bore and boom irrigator, it has made my business more efficient and productive."

Steve encourages other producers to act now and use the funding available through QRIDA to set their property up for the future.

"Apply for the grants, it's a necessity. The dry times will come and go but they will always be back." he said.

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

# RAD Grant helps Southern Downs producers build sheep reproductive facility

Works are underway on a sheep reproductive facility in the Southern Downs designed to fast-track Queensland's supply of genetically superior lambs while creating four direct jobs and 11 indirect jobs for Queenslanders as a result of the project.

Arolla Pastoral Company, a fifthgeneration family farm business located in Allora and run by James and Carla Pidgeon, is behind the project which aims to improve sheep fertility and the productivity of offspring.

"Instead of it taking us 10 years to get rid of sheep defects by natural birth, it will only take us a couple years through the use of artificial intelligence employed by the sheep reproductive facility," James said.

"The project diversifies our enterprise even more which is so important because we know weather and prices can change really quickly." "It feels great to be able to create local jobs in our Southern Downs community and help grow the sheep industry as more producers realise the profitability of mixed farming in changing climates."

The \$560,000 project is being funded by a \$200,000 Rural Agricultural Development (RAD) Grant from the Palaszczuk Government, and a \$360,000 co-contribution from Arolla Pastoral Company.

The company is one of 10 sheep and goat enterprises across rural and regional Queensland which collectively received just over \$1.8 million in funding under Round One of the RAD Grant program.

## QRIDA on the ground following Northern & Central QLD flooding

Representatives from QRIDA have been on the ground in affected areas to provide information and assistance about the disaster support available following the Northern and Central Queensland Monsoon Flooding event which impacted the North, Central and Gulf regions of Queensland from December 2022 to April 2023.

In April QRIDA Chief Executive Officer, Cameron MacMillan, and Regional Area Manager for the North West and Gulf, Bill Fletcher, spent time in Burketown where they met with Burke Shire council Mayor, Ernie Camp, made on-farm visits to producers and held a pop-up office for small businesses.

To help the recovery, QRIDA is administering financial assistance to directly affected primary producers, small businesses and non profit organisations in the Burke, Boulia, Carpentaria, Cloncurry, and Mornington Shire Councils, the Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Council and Mount Isa City Council.

### What assistance is available?

Assistance available for this event includes Extraordinary Disaster Assistance Recovery Grants of up to \$75,000 for primary producers, and \$50,000 for small businesses and non profit organisations, to help with clean-up costs.

Eligible producers, small businesses and non-profit organisations can also access Disaster Assistance Loans of up to \$250,000 and Disaster Assistance (Essential Working Capital) Loans of up to \$100,000.

# Sustainable fisher boosts business with new vessel and modern upgrades

Chris Bolton Fishing is feeding the growing appetite for their premium quality coral trout and bait with the purchase of bigger and better equipment funded by a Sustainability Loan from the Queensland Rural and Industry Development Authority (QRIDA).

"Our new boat is built for speed, and it allows us to get the fish and return home fast, so the produce is as fresh as possible," Chris said.

"Having another two tender vessels means we can supply twice as much fish as we were previously which is such a game-changer."

The upgrades were not only a win for the commercial fishing business, but also for the local economy.

"We've employed four extra fishermen, and we've tried to get them to do things the way we like them done and teach them about sustainability," he said. Chris said the process of applying for a Sustainability Loan from QRIDA was quick and easy and QRIDA's Far North Regional Area Manager Sam Spina answered all his questions with local knowledge and agribusiness expertise.

"We were happy to provide the Sustainability Loan to this business because the upgrades allowed them to increase productivity, while introducing new technology, particularly with the electronic anchors," he said.

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Currently the goat industry in South West Queensland is being impacted by several factors including lower demand internationally, resulting in reduced livestock prices and labour shortages affecting processing capacities.

These issues are not only straining producers' cashflow but also carrying capacities through the unintended retention of livestock.

If you're experiencing problems with the management of your business QRIDA may be able to provide options through the Farm Debt Restructure Office. This program is at arm's length to your existing financier and may provide proactive solutions to moving forward.
